1. Overview of Crooked Island, Bahamas

If you are looking for the true Bahamas with endless white sand beaches, palm trees, turquoise waters, excellent swimming, snorkeling and diving, fishing and especially bone fishing, solitude and some of the friendliest people on the planet, look no further. Crooked Island is calling your name.


With a size of 57 square miles (148 km2), Crooked Island is about 70% of the size of New Providence Island where Nassau is located. But its population of 330 people is only a tiny fraction and makes for a population density of only 6 people per square mile (2 people per km2). So, if you want to get away from it all, look no further. Crooked Island is calling your name.





On a cloudless night, you can enjoy gazillions of stars as there are only few artificial light sources.

If you stay on the beaches on the west side of Crooked Island then you will see the occasional cruise ship far away on the horizon and realize that you have found your place in paradise.



As to the pronunciation: The "e" in "Crooked" is not silent and pronounced as in "footed".

3. General Information

3.1 How to get to Crooked Island?

Crooked Island is off the beaten track and only very few tourists find their way to this remote island in the Bahamas.

The only options to get to Crooked Island are:

- two weekly flights (Wednesday and Saturday) from Nassau with Bahamas Air
- pre-Covid: the mail boat from Nassau which also brings supplies and typically arrives on 3 Fridays per month after a multi-day voyage
- private yacht or plane
- pedestrian ferry from Acklins Island

3.2 Is there public transportation on Crooked Island?

There is no public transportation on Crooked Island.

Ask your hotel if they can get you a rental car and expect to pay \$65 per day. Remember, cars drive on the left side of the road like in England and Australia. There are almost no road signs, so make sure to download the Crooked Island map to your favorite GPS.

3.5 Post Office on Crooked Island (map)

Located in the administrative office across the street from St. Michael Anglican Church, behind the door closest to the main road is the post office.

It also offers some banking services for locals who have accounts with it, but visitors cannot get any cash on Crooked Island, so make sure to bring enough money with you.

The first post office in The Bahamas used to stand in Pitts Town, but it is long gone.





4.1 Casuarina Pines Villas (map, reviews, website, facebook)

Named after the pine trees in front of the property, we loved Casuarina Pines Villas. It is located on a white sand beach on the west side of the island where you have turquoise water just a few feet outside your cabin. There is little current, so swimming is good and the rocks in the water make for real good snorkeling as the rocks provide lots of hiding places for fish.

The hotel is close enough to the Landrail Point settlement so that you can easily walk the 0.5 miles (1km) to e.g. the supermarket in town and far enough away that you can have nearly total solitude.

The road into town that google maps shows does not exist; the existing road is actually only half the distance into town. Don't worry; it is the only road here, so you cannot get lost.

Casuarina Pines Villas are managed by Hylene Moss and her husband Ellis. They are some of the nicest people and Hylene constantly managed to exceed our expectations.

One day I told her that I need to make an appointment for our Covid test and asked her about the clinic. The next thing I know is that she had made appointments for us.

Hylene is pronounced like "Eileen" with an "H", so like "Hi-lean".

The best way to reach here is by WhatsApp (+1-242-457-7005), but she responds promptly to Messenger (Casuarina Pines Villas) too.

All villas face west and you can see the beach and turquoise ocean waters you're your bed. The villas have a deck that is facing the beach and has with 2 chairs. About half way from the green villa to the beach is a covered area with a hammock and beach chairs and loungers for all guests to use. Wifi from our pink cabin (house #3) reached all the way out there. Next to the covered area is an outdoor shower.









5. What stores are on Crooked Island?

Crooked Island with its small population of 330 people has only a few stores. These stores do not have long opening hours. As an example, the <u>Green Valley Food Store</u> is open 7:30am-5pm, Sunday through Friday. It is important to note that the Landrail Point settlement is mostly settled by Seventh Day Adventists and that means that you cannot buy alcohol or tobacco and that everything is closed from sunset on Friday until sunset on Saturday for Sabbath.

Also, if the owner is sick or has other things to do, then the stores may temporarily close at any time during normal business hours.

5.1 Supermarkets

We have found 3 supermarkets stores on Crooked Island and there may be more.

The supermarkets here are basically one room in which food items and non-food items like home and vehicle repair items, over-the-counter medicine, body care and other items are sold.

Crooked Island is supplied by ship three times a month. The ship arrives Friday's at around 2pm and we found that the new supplies make it to the stores by about 4:30pm, shortly before the stores close and remain closed on Saturday.

Don't be surprised to see empty shelves and no fresh fruits or vegetables on Thursday or Friday before the ship comes in.









Scavella's Convenience Store (map)

Scavella's Convenience Store is a grocery store with a small selection only a few hundred feet to the west of Green Valley Food Store.

We found that some items there are a bit cheaper. A gallon of water is \$2 vs \$2.50 at Green Valley Food Store.

If the store has the "Open" sign in the window but is locked during business hours then just knock on the door of the blue house next to it and wait for the owner to come and let you in the store.

They can take credit cards but strongly prefer cash.

The store is not air conditioned.





5.4 Other stores on Crooked Island

5.4.1 Sharon's Boutique (map)

Sharon's Boutique is the largest clothing store on Crooked Island. You can also buy souvenirs, some housewares and beauty products here and rent a car.

Sharon is a nice lady and fantastic sales person.

She has another daytime job and therefore only opens Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6-9pm.









7.1 Beaches in the west of Crooked Island

7.1.1 Seahorse Shores Beach (map)

This 1.75 mile (2.8 km) long beach goes from Landrail Point to Pitts Town in the north west of Crooked Island.

It is one of the best beaches on Crooked Island. It features white sand and fantastic turquoise water and very little current.

Except for the northern part, where there is all sand, much of the transition from the beach into the water has flat rocks that you can walk over, even without water shoes, to get into the water.

Alternatively, there are sandy breaks between the rocks that allow you to enter the water without walking over the rocks.


As the rocks provide good hiding places for fish, you will see plenty of colorful fish just a few feet into the water.

I found one fantastic snorkeling spot (map) by the lonely palm tree about 150ft (50m) south of the abandoned shipwreck which lies on the shore south of Casuarina Pines Villas.

This is an area that is partially enclosed by volcanic rocks. It is excellent for snorkeling at low and high tide and there are plenty of colorful and not-so-colorful fish.







7.3 Beaches on the northeastern side of Crooked Island

7.3.1 Moss Town beaches (map)

The beaches here are mostly deserted and there are only few houses near the beach. The water is turquoise and the strip of white sand is very narrow at high tide in some areas.

The water was hazy when we were there.







7.3.3 Major's Cay Bay (map)

This is a beautiful mostly deserted bay with some of the most beautiful turquoise water I have ever seen and a wider strip of white sand compared to Colonel Hill Bay. We even saw 2 sea turtles swimming in the water.

The water was calm but much too hazy to snorkel.









8. Lagoons of Crooked Island

8.1 Salt Pond (map)

The salt pond is an inland lake that was used in the past to extract salt from ocean water. This industry was abandoned on Crooked Island but is still practiced on nearby Inagua Island.

Nowadays, Salt Pond with its mangroves is a paradise for sea birds and, during certain times of the year, for flamingoes.

Salt Pond starts at the bridge near <u>Casuarina Pine Villas Hotel</u> and ends near the eastern end of <u>North Beach</u>.
